GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (23:35-43)

The people stayed there before the cross watching Jesus. As for the leaders, they jeered at him. 'He saved others,' they said 'let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One.' The soldiers mocked him too, and when they approached to offer vinegar they said, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.' Above him there was an inscription: 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied 'today you will be with me in paradise.'

Sunday Homily: Jesus Christ, King of the Universe Fr. Roy John Elavumkal SMM

Introduction: This Sunday, at the end of Church's liturgical year, the readings describe the enthronement of the victorious Christ as King in Heaven in all his glory. Instituting this Feast of Christ the King in 1925, Pope Pius XI proclaimed: "Pax Christi in regno Christ" (the peace of Christ in the reign of Christ). This means that we live in the peace of Christ when we surrender our lives to him every day, accept him as our God, Saviour and King and allow him to rule our lives.

The Biblical basis of the feast: A) Old Testament texts: The title "Christ the King" has its roots both in Scripture and in the whole theology of the Kingdom of God. In most of the Messianic prophecies given in the Old Testament books of Samuel, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Daniel, Christ the Messiah is represented as a King. B) New Testament texts: a) In the Annunciation, recorded in Lk 13:2-33, we read: "The Lord God will make him a King, as his ancestor David was, and He will be the King of the descendants of Jacob forever and His Kingdom will never end." In fact, the Kingdom of God is the centre of Jesus' teaching and the phrase "Kingdom of God" occurs in the Gospels 122 times, of which 90 instances are uses by Jesus. b) The Magi from the Far East came to Jerusalem and asked the question: (Mt. 2:2) "Where is the baby born to be the King of the Jews? We saw his star... and we have come to worship him." c) During the royal reception given to Jesus on Palm Sunday, the Jews shouted: (Lk 19:38) "God bless the King, who comes in the name of the Lord." d) During the trial of Jesus described in today's Gospel, Pilate asked the question: (In 18:33): "Are you the king of the Jews?" Jesus replied: "You say that I am a king. I was born and came into this world for this one purpose, to bear witness to the Truth" (Jn 18:37) e) Today's Gospel tells us that the board hung over Jesus' head on the cross read: "Jesus the Nazarene, King of the Jews," (Lk 23:36; see also, Mt 27:37; Mk 15:26; Jn 19:19-20), and that, to the request of the repentant thief on the cross, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom," Jesus promised "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise" (Lk 23:39-43). f) Before his Ascension into Heaven, Jesus declared: (Mt 28:18): "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth." g) Finally (Mt 25:31), we read that Christ the King will come in glory to judge us on the day of the Last Judgment.

Application to Life: 1) We need to accept Christ the King as our Lord, King, and Saviour and surrender our lives to him. We surrender our lives to Jesus every day when we give priority to his teaching in our daily choices, especially in moral decisions. We should not exclude Christ our King from any area of our personal or family lives. In other words, Christ must be in full charge of our lives, and we must give him sovereign power over our bodies, our thoughts, our heart and our will. 2) We need to be serving disciples of a serving King. Jesus declared that he came not to be served but to serve and showed us the spirit of service by washing of the feet of his disciples. We become Jesus' followers when we recognize his presence in everyone, especially the poor, the sick, the outcast, and the marginalized in the society and render humble and loving service to Jesus in each of them. 3) We need to accept Jesus Christ as the King of love. Jesus came to proclaim to all of us the Good News of God's love and salvation, gave us his new commandment of love: "Love one another as I have loved you," (Jn 13:34), and demonstrated that love by dying for us sinners. We accept Jesus as our King of love when we love others as Jesus loved, unconditionally, sacrificially, and with agape love.



Overview of the Holy Mass Fr. Roy John Elavumkal SMM


At Mass we gather as the friends of Jesus coming together. We listen to the story about Jesus, told to us from the scripture. We give thanks to God the Father for all that Jesus did for us.

We go from Mass with Jesus as part of our lives. We now try to live as he did. The Mass is made up of twelve key moments. The 'Greeting' is the beginning of the celebration of Mass. Next is the 'Penitential Act' when we tell God we are sorry for the times we have not loved as we should have. Following this are the 'Scripture Readings' read by people from the assembly, after which the Priest reads the Gospel. The First and Second Readings, and the Gospel are explained by the Priest and he talks about what we can learn from them in the 'Homily'. The 'Creed' is when everybody in the Church stands up and says what they believe as a group. The 'Prayer of the Faithful' is when we offer prayers for people in need. People from the assembly lead us in this. The gifts of bread and wine are brought to the altar during the 'Preparation of the Gifts'. The 'Consecration of the bread and wine' is when the bread and wine are changed into the Body and Blood of Jesus.

We then speak the 'The Lord's Prayer' which Jesus taught us. We say it together to praise God for all that we have been given and to ask God to forgive us the things that we have done wrong. Next, we shake hands with the people around us to share the peace that Christ gives. This is called the 'Sign of Peace'. At 'Communion' those of us who have made our First Holy Communion, can now move forward to the altar to receive of Body and Blood of Jesus. This brings us closer to God. To finish Mass the 'Final Blessing' is spoken. The Priest blesses us and sends us from the church to bring Jesus to the people we meet by being loving and kind. Today, did I miss any of these twelve key moments?
